




We are proud that more students are learning te Reo Māori than any other language. Our goal is to create a Westlake Girls Whare Wānanga not only for our students but to serve the wider community on the North Shore and to contribute to the revitalisation of te Reo and tikanga Māori.





Whare Wananga

The \$750,000 Whare Wānanga will be the realisation of a longed-for and much-anticipated space. Te Rerenga Wāna will represent mana wāhine. The front of the building will reflect a whare rūnanga (meeting house) on a marae. The inside will reinforce the whare rūnanga theme with poupou, tukutuku and kōwhaiwhai.

The outside and inside dressings will be based mainly on contemporary style artwork similar to 'Te Hono ki Hawaiki' at Te Papa in Wellington with wall paintings, 3D poupou (MDF), tukutuku and kōwhaiwhai (student based, cross curriculum) and the carvings of the Pou Tokomanawa, Maihi, Amo, Koruru and Pare done by Westlake Alumna, Emma Ormsby.

Te Rerenga Wāna will symbolise 'Te Mana Wāhine' reflecting ' te Ao Māori' by providing a learning space for our te reo Māori classes and a cultural hub for our wider communities.

Students will learn the process of a pōwhiri through performing karanga, waiata, whaikōrero, and kapa haka for important events.

We are excited to offer our students, neighbouring schools and the wider community a vibrant and welcoming space for connection and learning, that reinforces our commitment to Te Tiriti and to Ngāti Pāoa, the mana whenua of the land on which our school sits.



Design of the Whare Wananga

Emma Ormsby (Ngāti Maniapoto, Ngāti Porou), is a freelance artist currently studying a conjoint Arts (Maori Studies/Screen Production) and Fine Arts degree at the University of Auckland.

Emma, in conjunction with a talented group of our art students, has created Māori sculpture artworks which are prototypes of the planned inside panels of the Whare Wānanga. These prototype designs centre around Māori female atua and celestial whakapapa.

The school is funding the design and architecture, engineering and construction of the Whare Wānanga. We are seeking funding to create the sculptural artworks which will form the pou and tukutuku panels of the Whare Wānanga.

Based on the prototypes developed, the cost to complete the interior is estimated to be \$350,000.00.
