Dr Lynne Coleman (née Donovan) MNZM MB ChB, Dip Obst, FRNZCGP; Dip Sports Med , PG DipBus, MInstD Westlake Class of 1977

Sports doctor for high performance athletes in New Zealand



Dr Lynne Coleman received an MNZM honour for services as a sports doctor in the Queen's Birthday Honours, 2015. This follows a long career as a GP and Obstetrician as well as in her specialised field as a sports doctor.

Dr Coleman, then Lynne Donovan, attended Westlake Girls from 1973-1977. She recalls, "Westlake Girls' High School and the education I received prepared me well for the rigors of medical school. I am very grateful to all the wonderful teachers I had and I have very fond memories of my time at Westlake".

She gained her medical degree in Auckland in 1985, her Diploma in Obstetrics in 1987, and a Postgraduate Diploma in Sports Medicine from Otago in 2001, while working full-time as a General Practitioner on North Shore.

She had long been keen on sport and the part sport plays in people's general well-being. Her first opportunity to work with elite athletes came in 2001 when she was designated as a Sports Doctor for the NZ Academy of Sport.

She has been involved with the medical team for the New Zealand Olympic and Commonwealth Games teams since 2004 Athens Olympics, including being Health Team co-leader for the 2006 Commonwealth Games, and then Health Team Leader for 2008 Beijing Olympics ,2010 Delhi Commonwealth Games and 2012 London Olympics. She attended 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games as part of the health team and is scheduled to attend the 2016 Rio Olympics.

She is a founder partner at the Apollo Medical Centre. This opened in 2005 and is a general practice and accident and medical practice. Lynne works there combining sports medicine with her GP/urgent care work. She is now completing her Fellowship in Urgent Care.

Her long-standing commitment to NZ high-performance sport includes serving as a medical director for Swimming NZ, Athletics NZ and Basketball NZ and as a team doctor for many national men's and women's sports teams. She has been a Member of the Sports Tribunal of New Zealand since 2008, was a member of the Waitemata District Health Board from 2001- 2010, and has volunteered her time to the Regional Sports Trust on the North Shore (Harbour Sport) since 2006, and Wilson Home Trust since the early 2000s.

Lynne continues to work at the Apollo Medical Centre and also works with elite athletes 2 half days a week at the Millennium Institute.

We are delighted to acknowledge Dr Coleman as one of our distinguished alumni and congratulate her on this national recognition.

Here they reflect on their time at Westlake

Sue McBride, HOD Visual Art



My time at Westlake Reflections of a well-known Head of Department

I came to Westlake in 1970 as a reliever, in the era of mini-skirts and 'op art' patterned fabric. There were about 800 students, a small staff to match and the school environment was almost rural. Ducks visited from Lake Pupuke as well as rabbits and

cows from Smale's farm. I was so impressed with the calibre of students and their rewarding art work that I stayed....and stayed.

Westlake Girls' staff were very sociable and based in two workrooms. It was there that you made friends for life. Our staffroom was always busy and was a central venue for meetings and events. When Principal Helen Ryburn held PPTA meetings, every staff member attended. The Hall was used for prize givings, balls, productions, performances and artwork days; all observed by photographs of three previous principals from the back wall.

There were two art rooms, B1 and B2, plus a concreted area with two kick wheels for producing pottery and an indoor kiln. There were two art teachers, myself and Betty Wong – who became Betty Sew Hoy and eventually moved to Los Angeles. Communication to students was with blackboard and chalk. Staff used a 'Banda' machine (using methylated spirits) to produce multiple notes for students and school reports were handwritten.

With a five day timetable and double art periods, the department grew. Julie Collis replaced Betty and we were joined by a part time teacher. 'Makeover Stage One' saw an office appear between B1 and B2, and a toilet block converted into a darkroom. B3 became a working space for students studying towards FA Prelim, plus Art History with the room divided in half! The kiln was moved outside and pottery wheels found more interested owners.

Over several years we had Art Days out, visiting Long Bay, Milford Marina and we caught a ferry to Motuihe Island. Some Art Days were in the school hall or we had Art Camps, where artists ran workshops, showed slides or talked about their work. This assisted students producing work for School Certificate, Sixth Form Certificate and Fine Arts Preliminary, which became Bursary. Life Drawing classes were held after school in B1.

Art Departments in Auckland annually attended the Auckland Star Secondary Schools' Art Exhibition. We would drive over the bridge with our cars brimming to the roof with work for the selection process which was carried out by Art advisors and invited teachers. Size and scale was not a problem, as this was pre-NCEA. The opening was attended by anyone participating in Art education, as well as interested principals. The reputation of Westlake's Art Department grew with the work exhibited, as well as the work seen and recorded in external examination systems.

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In 1988 'Makeover Stage Two' saw B Block become the Art Department, with the support of Principal Alison Gernhoefer and her Board. We were given a new darkroom, with a teaching space. A resource room was added for six staff; four general classrooms; an area for printmaking and a large space for senior painting, sculpture, design and art history. With further growth, design moved to a prefab and art history to another block with tiered seating. Community needs were changing and we had to adapt the curriculum offered to students, including the introduction of NCEA. Blackboards were replaced by white boards and we shared one computer between us, for reports. We gained a photocopier which was a real plus.

There were rewards with Art staff taking a group of students to Te Papa when it opened and to look at the exhibition of Wearable Art. Staff were given opportunities to visit galleries and exhibitions out of New Zealand, visiting Sydney and Melbourne.

In 2004 we moved again. This move brought art history and design back under the umbrella of the Art Department that now resided in A Block. We now had nine staff.

As an Art educator, I have always believed every student from Year 9 should participate in Core Art before moving into Year 10. Not every student comes into the school with an interest in the subject, or having had experience in a strongly structured art programme. It has always been a reward to hear a senior student talk about their early experiences when they first enter the school and how they became interested in the subject, leading to their continuation of some aspect of the Visual Arts when leaving school.

There have been many wonderful students. Seeing them coming through from Year 9 is what keeps you going. I can only name a few but there are many, many more. For example: Dr Ngarino Ellis, Senior Lecturer in Art History and Humanities at Auckland University; Heather Galbraith, Associate Professor in the School of Fine Arts, Massey University, Wellington; Monique Redmond, Lecturer at AUT; Sophie Wylie, Architect; Judy Millar, Painter......and so it goes on.

Thoughts after 30 years teaching at Westlake Girls - for Alumni

When I first arrived in Auckland, in January 1985, it was a cultureshock. To see bright green grass and blue sea as I crossed the Harbour Bridge each morning was dazzling, after the grey, bicycle ridden streets of Shanghai post the Cultural Revolution. I'd come from below zero, concrete floors, no heating, metal benches, woollen long johns

and balaclavas

In a land of privilege and opportunity, it has been a challenge to educate North Shore girls. Over the years, the cohort has changed dramatically. I feel I brought China with me

I have thrived teaching here. I've enjoyed such diversity. I've taught English mainly and really appreciated the opportunity to teach Cambridge Literature at IGCSE, A/S and A level alongside NCEA.

For many years, I also taught Year 12/Form 6 (before NCEA) Journalism and focused on producing an edition of *Cygneture* twice a year. This was an exhilarating and nerve-wracking, long- hour experience. In the early years I tried to teach Beginners Mandarin - but the native speakers soon sorted that!

For 15 years I was a Dean, alongside Janet Welch for the first 5+ years until Andrew arrived. This role as Dean was very fulfilling. The mentoring and

supporting troubled students was very rewarding and a great privilege.

When Kim Basse moved to Takapuna Grammar as a D.P., I accepted the role of Head of English. This was a very demanding position in charge of 3 year levels, 15 staff and teaching 4 classes. I was certainly spread very thinly. After 5 years at the helm, I chose to step down and take on the responsibility of Teacher in Charge of Year 13 and focus on Scholarship and Debating. This has been a really affirming move

We have enjoyed many successes in Journalism, with awards for various sections of editions in *Cygneture* and latterly, *The College Herald* where students won computers. Over the years, we've won the annual Thorburn Debate against the Boys' School many times amidst the hilarity of a hall full of rowdy Year 13s, and teams' dressed as *The Three Graces* or walking in to music belting out "*We Are the Champions*"

In English we've enjoyed great success in Scholarship, particularly over the past 2 years when we've been awarded 14 each year. This can be partially attributed to the early morning lectures mainly from the English teaching staff, for extension Year 12 and Year 13. We averaged over 30 students, up to 60 at times. While I was HOD we enjoyed a focus on "English Weeks" with student led activities, book swaps, Shakespeare days when the English teachers hired outfits and we even had an Elizabethan banquet complete with Great Dane.

I'm sold up in Auckland and will be on the road to Kerikeri, Bay of Islands on December 08 for R and R.

I'm looking to new opportunities, free of gridlock, queues, traffic lights and concrete to the lush, green, orange groves and time to talk and enjoy people's company in a walk or over a coffee without one eye on the clock. The Saturday Kerikeri market is stunning and reflective of the local community's interests and talents.

Alumna Guest Speaker, 2015 Prizegiving

Dr Jenny Wagener (née Willis), Class of 1991

Surgeon, Missionary Surgeon: BHB, MB ChB (1998), FRACS (2008)

Jenny Wagener (Willis) returned to Westlake Girls as the guest speaker at the 2015 prizegiving. It was an inspiring presentation, with students and families able to hear about some of Jenny's journey since leaving Westlake in 1991, and her



message and advice to those leaving Westlake this year. Jenny had a challenge for the students, when planning and working towards their goals, to take it one step further and think about how those decisions could have an impact on others. Her own course reflects her desire to use her skills to benefit others, as well as the importance of family support and focusing on what is really important.

Jenny left Westlake planning to be a nurse

and had received encouragement from her teachers to also apply for Medical School, for which she was accepted. It was a short visit to a mission in Tanzania in 1993, after a year of study at Auckland University, that confirmed her desire to train to be a doctor and return to Tanzania to help the local people, mainly Masai communities – something that had been a dream since she was 3.

Jenny spent 6 years as a volunteer medical missionary in Arusha, Tanzania, from 2007 to 2013, living and working there with her husband and 4 children. Balancing work and family, she ran a weekly clinic and had a weekly operating schedule based at the Selian Lutheran Hospital, often under challenging conditions. Her special interests there were thyroid and prostate surgery and surgical education. During that time she also worked several short stints as a locum doing surgery throughout rural Australia.

Jenny is now a surgeon at Middlemore Hospital where she deals with a range of acute and elective surgical conditions. Her main interest is in breast and thyroid surgery. She is a member of the Breast Surgeons of Australia and New Zealand and is also an Honorary lecturer at the University of Auckland Medical School.

Along the way, Jenny has followed a variety of other interests. She is a church pastor and former Marriage Celebrant. She also has her private pilot licence and enjoys hiking and running half marathons.

We are delighted that Jenny has reconnected with us and with her interest in her

Kayla McAlister: Class of 2006 New Zealand Women's Sevens



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Kayla McAlister is a member of the New Zealand Women's Sevens team. She was also a member of 2013 team that won the Women's Sevens World Cup held in Moscow, Russia. She visited Westlake in Term 3, 2015 for a series of lunchtime coaching sessions (Rippa Rugby: Have a Go) to encourage girls to play rugby.

Kayla comments, "It was great getting back to my old stomping ground, seeing some talented girls and especially seeing the new sporting facilities".

Kayla played netball throughout her school years, with obvious talent, and by 2011 was playing for the Northern Mystics netball team in the ANZ Championship.

"When I was at Westlake Girls, netball and touch were the main sports I played, as women's rugby wasn't very big back then. But now, having the game of rugby sevens as an Olympic sport, it is a great pathway for girls to make a career out of and potentially experience the world's largest sporting pinnacle event (the Olympics)".

There was already a strong family interest in rugby, with her brother, Luke, (WBHS) an All Black, but Kayla's interest in rugby was only sparked when the NZ Rugby Union had a campaign 'Go4Gold' in 2012, promoting Women's Sevens for the 2016 Rio Olympics. After trialling, Kayla was named in the 2012 NZ squad which took part in the Women's World Rugby Sevens series, and also has for 2013, 2014 and 2015 seasons. They travel and play in tournaments held in places such as Dubai, China, Brazil, London, Amsterdam, America and Canada.

"It's not a bad way to see the world - playing sport whilst representing your country and family and of course getting in some great shopping too".

Although Kayla switched to rugby relatively late, she has been very successful and was named the IRB Women's Sevens Player of the Year, the same year that New Zealand won the Women's Sevens World cup in 2013.

There are a number of steps and another whole series to travel and play before the Olympics in August 2016. She has combined her playing with a full-time job as a Judicial Support Officer with the Ministry of Justice for several years, but with training every day now and being a full time contracted Sevens player, she has recently made a switch to studying part time. Now, she trains every morning and afternoon (on the North Shore at the NZ High Performance Centre) and travels to tournaments whilst studying Early Childhood through the New Zealand Tertiary College.

We look forward to following her path to Rio over the next year.
